A new orchard at Mudchute – with help from the London Orchard Project and local schools, a community orchard has been planted at Mudchute, with apple, pear and plum trees. Read more [here](#).

More free wildflower seeds – packets of wildflower seeds to attract bees and butterflies are available again free to Tower Hamlets residents and schools. Estonian Cormorant still at East India Dock Basin (but no Portuguese ducks) – the [Cormorant bearing an Estonian colour-ring](#), reported in the last *Newsflash*, is still visiting the pier by East India Dock Basin. But there has been no sign of either of the [Portuguese Tufted Ducks](#) this winter.

Mild weather brings an early spring – many spring flowers have appeared up to 6 weeks early this year due to the mild winter. Fine displays of flowering bulbs can be seen at Tower Hamlets Cemetery Park and on the Manchester Estate, where more than 10,000 bulbs were planted in 2012 by corporate volunteers.
