Open Garden Squares Weekend 2018 – Open Garden Squares Weekend, on 9-10 June 2018, is an opportunity to feed your curiosity and explore over 230 private, secret and little-known gardens all over London. Gardens range from the historic and traditional to the new and experimental, and include private gardens, roof gardens, community allotments, gardens belonging to historic buildings, institutions, cafés, schools and shops. Avocets visit East India Dock Basin – three Avocets visited East India Dock Basin Nature Reserve in mid-March. This was the first ever record of these elegant, black-and-white birds in Tower Hamlets, and they attracted quite a few birdwatchers to the Basin during their four-day stay. Kingfisher bank gets a makeover – the Kingfisher nesting bank beside the Regent's Canal at Brunton Wharf in Limehouse has received an artistic makeover. Local artist Curtis Hylton has transformed its stark concrete appearance with a camouflage pattern made up of kingfisher silhouettes in various colours. While this will make no difference to any Kingfishers which choose to nest here, it makes it much more interesting and attractive to people walking along the tow-path. [Read more and see photos](#).

Create a Plot for Pollinators – the charity Butterfly Conservation is asking people to help to reverse the declines of butterflies, moths and other pollinating insects. Setting aside just one square metre of outdoor space and filling it with nectar-rich flowers will feed hundreds of insects. The initiative is supported by top TV gardener Alan Titchmarsh. Plots created in Tower Hamlets will contribute to our Local Biodiversity Action Plan, which has an objective to increase the amount of nectar-rich flowers available for bumblebees and other pollinators.
