Look out for Ash Dieback – this fungal disease, which has recently been found in Britain, is a serious threat to our Ash trees. It's not been found in Tower Hamlets, but we should look out for signs of it. A boost for Mudchute's "dragons" – Mudchute's amphibian habitats are set to be improved thanks to charity Froglife's "Dragon Finder" project. Lottery funding will provide at least 2 new permanent ponds and possibly restoration of a short section of the famous "Newtie" ditch. More news soon....

Portuguese ducks back again – the two Tufted Ducks, marked in Portugal with red nasal saddles, returned to East India Dock Basin in September. The male was seen from 6 to 19 September, the female from 17 to 26 September and again from 12 November, having been south of the river at Thamesmere in between times. Read more [here](#).

Goldcrests prominent among autumn migrants – unusually high numbers of Britain's smallest bird, the Goldcrest, have been seen around Tower Hamlets this autumn. Other interesting birds this autumn include a very late Lesser Whitethroat at Poplar Dock on 6 November and the first ever Wigeon on East India Dock Basin on 23 October.
