Colletidae

*Colletes daviesanus - numerous in meadow areas

Adrenidae

- *Andrena bicolor common in spring
- *Andrena chrysosceles seen once on 2 June
- *Andrena cineraria occasionally seen on willow catkins
- *Andrena clarkella- fairly common in spring
- *Andrena denticulata 1 on 26 June
- *Andrena flavipes common in spring

Andrena fulva - common

Andrena haemorrhoa - fairly common in spring

- *Andrena labiata seen once in May on greater stitchwort
- *Andrena negroaenea fairly common
- *Andrena nitida common

Andrena scotica - abundant in north of cemetery, nests communally between graves

Halictidae

*Lasioglossum calceatum -abundant in late summer, often on golden rod

*Lasioglossum morio - specimen collected definitely this species, probably abundant

*Halictus rubicundus - common

Melittidae

Melitta leporina – 1 male 26/6/16 on wild marjoram in the chalk maze

Megachilidae

Anthidium maculatum – fairly common in south of cemetery

Chelostoma campanularum- abundant on nettle-leaved bellflower along paths Osmia bicornis - fairly common in north of cemetery where they nest in the walls Osmia careulescens - fairly common

- *Osmia leaiana common in south of cemetery, often on everlasting pea
- *Megachile centuncularis common in south of cemetery
- *Megachile versicolor common in south of cemetery, often on everlasting pea
- *Megachile willughbiella common in south of cemetery

Apidae

Nomada flava - abundant in north of cemetery where host *Andrena scotica* nests *Nomada goodeniana* - abundant

Anthophora bimaculata - fairly common along south of cemetery

Anthophora furcata - fairly common along path edges on hedge woundwort

Anthophora plumipes - abundant March-May

*Anthophora quadrimaculata – a male on 18 August

Melicta albifrons - locally scarce, only 2 records in cemetery

*Bombus campestris - 1 record in 2016

Bombus hortorum - common

Bombus hypnorum - abundant throughout cemetery

Bombus lapidarius - common

*Bombus lucorum – fairly common

Bombus pascuorum - abundant throughout cemetery

*Bombus pratorum – fairly common

*Bombus rupestris – 1 queen in August

Bombus terrestris - abundant throughout cemetery

Bombus vestalis - numerous, recorded 5 April to 5 September

*Apis melifera - common
